I'm getting pretty excited for our "Writer's Free for All" to start!
Ruth Steinkoenig is going to be teaching this class. Whether you're a seasoned writer, have no experience whatsoever, or are somewhere in between, we welcome you to join us! Our first session will be September 17th at 7 pm with meetings to follow the 3rd Monday of each month. Come, try something new and different with us!
Well, I finished my annual report to the State Library of lowa – all 167 questions on it! It really is pretty interesting to compile these statistics. Here are a few things I learned:

*We have 26,353 items available to check out, that's roughly the same as last year.

*Total number of checkouts last year was 42,355, which is down about 3% from that crazy, record smashing number we had a year ago (I have to admit it's been a bit of a relief to not be quite that busy!)

*We had a total of 185 (last year was 135) library sponsored programs with a total attendance of 3,926 (last year was 3,386.) Oh my, that's an average of something happening every other day! Wheev!

*We have 9 public use computers compared to 6 last year. Total users were 3,694 this year, 3,207 last year.

*All this with a total budget that was 6,5% smaller than last year. I know I'm a bit prejudiced, but I'd say those are some pretty good stats!
